Message from the Headteacher – Mr Chris Bishop

This summer term has been marked by lots of unusual events - extra bank holidays, teacher strike days, a Coronation and sadly the sudden passing of our trusted friend and colleague, Russell Plester (Headteacher of Finham Park 2). I visited Finham Park 2 a few times over the past few weeks, to say hello and help out as needed. It was so humbling to see so many thoughtful 'yellow and blue' flowers. They were from schools across Coventry and Warwickshire - from friends, colleagues and well-wishers.

Our football teams have done very well this year with both Year 7 and 11 teams winning the Coventry Schools cup in their age groups. It was remarkable seeing them demonstrate our values of humility, kindness, courageousness, perseverance and integrity on the football pitch. They were such a credit to the school, to you and to each other. The Duke of Edinburgh expedition was brilliantly executed with students receiving high praise from people they engaged with. Whilst walking, they came across a very poorly member of the public and thanks to their quick thinking and World Class skills, saved their life! I could not be more amazed by the humble manner in which they acted. Our debating team attended a regional debate and public speaking competition. We have been busy recruiting some excellent teachers and support staff for the coming academic year. These roles will enable us to continue to grow sustainably over the coming years as more students fill the lower year groups as well as providing for an ever-increasing number in the Sixth Form. We have had over 420 applications for places in Year 12 for next year and over 600 for Year 7. Clearly, not all of these will materialize into offers of a place but it does present opportunities for growth and development that we have been planning for some time.

It is an exciting time of the year to be thinking about our plans for next year and the future and with FinhamFest on the horizon again and a number of trips and visits going out, there continues to be opportunities for everyone to experience world class opportunities as part of Finham Park School.

Restorative justice at Finham Park allows those who are harmed, or affected by conflict caused by another, to come together to find a more constructive and positive way to repair this relationship. In order for this to be successful, all parties involved need to adhere to the following four "R's"

- Respect- respect for everyone their thoughts, feelings and opinions and learning to value them.
 Responsibility- for everyone to take accountability for their own actions.
- Repair- to help everyone involved repair the relationship and or behaviour, giving necessary skills to help

identify a solution that suits all.

• Re-integration- to support all parties involved, allowing for smooth transition for the next meeting together a.k.a. a clean slate!

Restorative justice at Finham is managed by a college student well-being officer. This process is facilitated between the victim or victims of the incident and the offender For us this can be between individual students or a group or between students and teachers. Everyone has a right to be heard!

Granada Trip – Miss Danielle Malin

On Sunday 4th July a group of 50 Year 9 and 10 students accompanied by 5 staff members arrived at Finham to travel down to Heathrow for the flight to Malaga. After a late arrival at the hotel in Granada we quickly got round to exploring the city on Monday, with a quest expertly led by Mr. Downie. The highlight of the week was visiting our link school in Almeria where we got to meet Spanish students and talk to them about our town and our school. Students made friends with one another, sharing Snapchat and Instagram details so they could keep in touch, and they even joined us on the beach in the afternoon to spend more time together. Other highlights of the week included a tour of the Alhambra (with Ms. Malin and Ms. Lopez sharing a variety of historical facts!) and, of course, the much-anticipated trip to the water park. Students were exceptionally well behaved and were a credit to the school, speaking some great Spanish in restaurants, cafes and at the airport. Well done to all the students involved, we are very proud of your hard work and behaviour on the trip.







Prison, ME? NO WAY! – Year 9 Crime & Safety awareness – Mr Lewis Baker

The day was organised to educate students about how different choices can affect their lives. Lots of friendly volunteers from The Red Cross, Prison? Me? No way! and Prison staff came in to help and give hands on experience. I asked some students to write up about the day and this is what they said

We were all thoroughly educated and really do not want to go to prison. The focus of the day was to teach us about anti-social behaviour using role-plays with students being taken through the crime, arrest, prosecution and conviction processes. We also talked about how easy it is to become involved in crime and the consequences of criminal activity for both the victim and the perpetrator.





The first activity was the session on one punch. We role-played what could happen if we were in a gang and were caught by the police. We went through the consequences of being in a gang and we got involved with the roleplaying whilst enjoying ourselves.

The second session was a talk from two ex-prison convicts, we all felt safe and happy for them to be there since they were very approachable and open to questions. They were very passionate about kids not getting into crime and gangs. We felt we could ask more questions of them because they were not an authority figure and we could be more open with them because they were like us at our age and wants us to lead a good life that is crime free. This began with a 30-minute presentation about the ex-offenders background, brief details about their crime, impact that their actions have had upon their lives and their families' lives and their future beyond custody. Lots of us felt emotional about what happened and how it affected their life. Their captivating story changed some of our views on crime and how many people it could effect.

The third session was definitely something to remember. Two prison guards came in and gave us a lesson of a lifetime. For the first 30 minutes, one guard told us about how hard it is in prison and how none of us would survive in prison. This really helped put things into perspective. The officer was full of answers to all of our questions and was helpful. For the last 30 minutes of the lesson, we met up with another officer. He took us all outside and split us into two groups. He explained to us about what a normal prison cell would look like. None of us liked the description so you can imagine how we felt when we got into one. On the back of a van was a prison cell, we went in with our two groups and it was cramped. Even though there was a lot of us in there we were able to see just how cramped it really was. It was an amazing experience overall and it definitely showed us how bad prison really was. The fourth session was led by the Red Cross and was definitely worth being there for. The person who led the session was straight to the point and helped us learn a vital life skill. We learnt how to properly perform CPR and we did it in a fun environment. The person was open with us and answered all of our questions with enthusiasm. We all managed to have a practice with "Resus Annie" the CPR doll and we all came out of the lesson feeling that if someone was to drop to the floor we would be able to assist.





The final session was the County Lines presentation. This was extremely interesting and we all learnt about the process of what county lines is and how easy it is to get involved. Why gangs target young people with gifts and promises and then make us repay the favour by taking drugs to different cities. They told us about all of the bad things that could happen in prison and it is safe to say that we were all a bit scared, but we all enjoyed ourselves and learnt a lot. Over all the whole day was worthwhile and it helped us all see that prison really isn't worth it. It really made us think about how our actions affects our friends, family and the people around us. All of the volunteers and staff members were helpful and informative.

Missing days of school has a massive impact on not only students' learning but also impacts their own attendance percentage and their mentor group attendance. We encourage students to meet an attendance level of 96% over the year and with parents' help we can help them achieve this.

Our data story for attendance and behaviour since September 2021

We thought it would be a good time to share some data we have recently been analysing to explain how the landscape in certain areas has changed over the past 2 academic years. We hope you will find the analysis useful.



Lates: As you will be aware from correspondence home we have been educating students as to the importance of being on time to school and also to each lesson in the school day. Our mantra has simply been be in the right place, at the right time, doing the right thing. Through having a concerted effort, informing home where support is required and teaching the students to move directly from one lesson to the other, you can see on the graph opposite how the total number of lates across the whole school has dropped significantly.



Total attendance: Similarly to our focus on lates, we have also focused on attendance. You will have received communication at the start of each half term since Easter about the previous half term's attendance in comparison to your child's overall attendance. The aim of this is to spot any patterns early and, working together, ensure that each child has the highest possible attendance to school, therefore significantly increasing their life chances as a result. Currently our overall attendance is 93% with the Coventry average sitting at 90%. The national average is 87.7.

Total % PA YTD: PA stands for Persistent Absence. This represents the percentage of students that have an attendance of below 90%. Our current figure sits at 13.6% with Coventry PA sitting at 28.9%. There have been studies that have concluded that every 10% drop in attendance from 100% equates to a student achieving one whole grade less for **each** of their subjects. Ie a student with an attendance of 80% would achieve grade 4's in all their subjects compared to a student of a similar ability at the start of secondary school with a 100% attendance achieving grade 6's in all of their GCSE subjects.





Suspensions: The graph opposite highlights our two-year trend in terms of suspensions issued. The Aut 1 to the left is the first half term after students returned to school after the second COVID lockdown and were settling back down in to 'normal' school routines. Interestingly to give a context, the peak of the Aut2 to the right included 3 students being issued over a third of the overall suspensions. Since this peak we have put in a programme called the Passport to Suspension Reduction which is implemented once a student returns from suspension and aims to eliminate repeat offenders. The impact can be seen in this graph.



MUSIC BUSINESS, PERFORMANCE & TECHNOLOGY



The MAC Project – Mr Ben Dugdale

During the summer term for the first time we are working with The Coventry Boys and Girls Club to introduce the MAC Project. The MAC (Music and Change) Project is designed as a course to engage young people about career possibilities within music. From production, to artist management, the MAC project seeks to give participants a new pathway to professional studies, in an informal and immersive manner. The MAC Project is being rolled out in schools in Coventry, with plans to introduce sessions within the CBGC Club House on Whitefriars Street. The course was envisioned and championed by CBGC Youth Leader, Leah O'Loughlin, and is designed and taught by Howard Richards and John Bernard.

Various students have been invited to take part in the sessions and it is particularly valuable to those who may feel disconnected with their current education or need a positive environment. The sessions provide both theory and practical lessons, with one-to-one mentoring and guidance on how to pursue a career in the music industry. Having a Publication in The Design and Technology Associations magazine (that goes out nationally to all secondary and primary members of the association) – The Technology Department

Finham Park is a popular, successful and exciting secondary comprehensive school of over 1,650 students, located in the southwest of Coventry. Borough Market Food Trip

The Design and Technology department is part of the Creative Design Faculty and is run by Richard Elliott. As a department we are constantly striving for ways to develop our teaching and delivery of the subject as well as the content to ensure our students not only achieve in our subject but also enjoy and are excited by it. Our department is made up of five specialist teachers and we are lucky enough to have two technicians (one food and one workshop based).

Brand new food room

Our school recently invested in a new food room for the department, and this has seen an increase in student numbers choosing the subject as well as an ability to develop what can be taught in the room and what our students can achieve. We deliver the WJEC Food Preparation and Nutrition GCSE which equips students with not only practical cooking skills but the theoretical knowledge of food science, nutrition, and healthy eating. Our specialist food teacher Baldeep Devgun has developed the subject to one that excites and inspires our students in the preparation of food.

London Borough Market

In December 2022 we took our Year 9 and 10 GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition students to London Borough Market with an initial short stop off at Winter Wonderland, Hyde Park. We were focusing on the popular and ever-growing topic of 'Street Food' and Borough Market ticks these boxes wonderfully. Some of our students will have never been to London before and certainly not seen the levels of food choice and variety as seen on the market. This trip is an opportunity for them to experience food past the shelves of their local supermarket.

In the lessons prior to the trip, our students had been making and shaping various flavours of fresh pasta (including spinach pasta and a chocolate pasta – which they surprisingly loved)! Our Year 10s had been pastry making including a beautifully colourful and seasonal vegetable quiche. There were many examples of pasta and noodle pots and both sweet and savoury pastry items available at the market for students to see,







taste, evaluate and consolidate back into their practical lessons at school.

We had done the trip prior to COVID, and it had been so popular that we were keen to reinstate it as soon as we were able to. We believe highly in extracurricular opportunities to bring the students' learning to life and this trip does exactly that. We often run this trip in conjunction with our Product Design A-level students who come to London at the same time to visit the Design Museum and the Victoria and Albert Museum as part of their courses.

Borough Market is a fantastic experience for students and one that I would highly recommend as an alternative learning environment.

Generous helpings

The coach dropped us directly outside one of the entrances to the market and once inside students were able to explore independently in groups of no less than three, but not leaving the market boundary. We visited on a Thursday as the Borough Market website advises Wednesdays and Thursdays to be the best time for schools to visit as the market tends, in general, to be much quieter on those days. It has an abundance of fresh produce with stalls dedicated to cheeses, bread, fish, vegetables etc. Basically, every kind of produce you can imagine and with stall holders who are extremely knowledgeable and willing to engage with our students. The free samples are very much appreciated too! It is the perfect location for discussing food provenance and variety and bringing this conversation to life.

The students and staff bought lunch at the market (with pupil premium funding being used where needed) which allowed them to experience the food further. The prepared food choice is vast with an array of multi-cultural delights cooked right there in front of you, many in huge simmering pans. The paella looked like it was a big hit with the public. Vegetarians and vegans were well catered for with a vast choice of dishes available. The queue for the 'Humble Crumble' stall was so long it was easy to see why it was so popular when one of our students showed us her delicious looking dessert.
