Why do we have LGBTQ+ History Month?

A BBC report showed that people being bullied in schools for being lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender is the most common form of bullying.

LGBTQ+ people (especially those who are of ethnic minority) are at a greater risk of hate crime compared to cisgender heterosexual people.

Without inclusive education, many LGBTQ+ young people feel isolated, or even unwanted in school.

One in eight LGBTQ+ people aged 18-24 have attempted to end their life, and almost half of trans people have thought about taking their life.

Half of LGBTQ+ people have experienced depression and 3/5 have experienced anxiety.


Nationally, only 19.4% of survey respondents said they had been taught positive representations of LGBTQ+ people, history or events at school.

Why do we celebrate LGBTQ+ History Month?

- Helps create an inclusive environment where LGBTQ+ members of our community feel safe and a part of our school.
- Highlights positive achievements of LGBTQ+ people in society, and teaches us history that we may never learn otherwise.
- Can reduce bullying and unkind behaviour motivated by prejudice.
- . Improves mental health, knowledge, and acceptance.


Bayard Rustin (1912 - 1987)





Organised 1941 March on Washington, where Martin Luther King gave his 'I have a dream' speech. Due to criticism about his sexuality he had to work behind the scenes. Activism: civil rights, workers' rights, gay rights.

Alan Turing (1912 - 1954)




Mathematician who broke the Enigma cipher during WW2, and essentially invented modern computing.

When it was found out that he was gay, he was forced to choose between prison and hormone therapy. He chose the latter.


He was incapable of completing any of his work, having been banned from government projects, due to his persecution.

He ended his life one year later.
